With Calgary becoming increasingly diverse every year, learning about different cultures and their various perspectives on health is crucial for patient-centered care. Our event, themed around celebrating multiculturalism in medicine in the many forms that it takes, aims to recognize the importance of inclusion and cultural awareness among future physicians-to-be and beyond, creating not only culturally competent doctors, but an entire community based around the principles of respect and inclusion.



This event will foster collaboration between the medical community and the greater Calgary community. Our showcase focuses on the incredible diversity found within our city, and highlights the importance of celebrating the things that are at the core of our identity as Calgarians and Canadians. With healthcare being identified as the second-biggest issue facing Albertans today, we understand the importance of providing quality care for everyone, regardless of background.

Why is this showcase important?

- Medicine in North America often focuses on the biomedical model of healthcare, which thinks of the human body as a machine that just needs to be fixed.
- It ignores other aspects that impact health, and the other forms of health that exist, including the mental, spiritual, and emotional.
- As future healthcare practitioners, we need to work together and empower our patients from different backgrounds to explore health in a holistic manner.
- By teaching about culturally competency, we are equipping the next generation of doctors with the necessary tools to provide healthcare for all.

Questions we want to answer

- There are various forms of medicine knowledge across the world - how can we acknowledge and celebrate this expertise and diversity?
- How can healthcare practitioners support patients hoping to navigate a complex and confusing healthcare system?
- How can an understanding of cultural competency and humility create deeper connections between physicians and patients, leading to the betterment of patient care?

Components

of our event

Our event has 3 major components.

Keynote Speakers and Performances For our main-stage event, we will be inviting speakers from various walks-of-life, including Indigenous Elders, practicing physicians, and community members, to speak on their experiences with multiculturalism in medicine, and their key takeaways.

Throughout the evening, different cultural groups will be invited to perform on our main stage to honour and celebrate the cultural diversity of Calgary.

Open Tabling

Cultural organizations from the University of Calgary and the greater Calgary community are invited to table, where they can share their cultures, food, medical practices, and more. The tabling event will provide attendees the opportunity to connect with and learn about various community organizations within our city, and explore various cultures they would have otherwise not encountered.

Educational Workshops

Cultural groups are invited to host small sessions to educate attendees on their various cultural practices. These sessions will be held in several classrooms throughout University of Calgary's Foothills Campus.

Examples for these sessions can include learning about the different medicinal herbs used in cultures throughout the world, acupuncture, ceremonies, and more.
